


Sacraments



Gospel Reflection

Lately I've been listening to a science-based podcast on healthy daily living. The host frequently discusses the wide range of health benefits of sleep. So, each night I'm trying to get more, and better, slumber, and it's helping me feel energized. So, why in the world should we follow Christ's advice this week? "Watch therefore, for you do not know when the master of the house will come ... lest he find you asleep." Isn't sleep, especially at midnight and cockcrow, a good thing?

Of course, it is. But the wakefulness the Lord calls us to is a deep, personal orientation to Him. A nightly vigil is therefore a metaphor for this, but it's not just that. We should give up real sleep in order to pray, too. This difficult practice is a time-tested way to foster wakefulness of heart. When we give up sleep to pray, it focuses us. We learn that life is not an endless series of days. You and I belong to the Lord — awake or asleep, in life and in death. Sooner or later, even our need for our physical sleep will pass away. And our attentiveness to God — that is, whether we are awaiting Him to meet us — will be all that matters.

May I challenge us this week and this Advent to intentionally give up at least one hour of sleep each week for prayer? Stay up later, wake up in the middle of the night, or an hour earlier, and pray. Will we be a bit more tired the next day? Yes. But we'll be amazed at the spiritual wakefulness that results, too. — Father John Muir ©LPi

2023 CCS/CHS NORTHWEST PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

- CCS NW is bringing resources to our region from the new **Catholic Healthcare Collaboration** with two newly trained **Community Health Workers** at CHS low-income housing in Bellingham and Sedro Woolley.
- CCS worked with **St. Pius X Parish Mercy House** to support parishioners as they converted an underutilized building on their Mountlake campus to a multiservice center housing a social service navigator and a hub for **PREPARES**.
- **NW Recovery Centers** have opened a new treatment center in Blaine and collaborated with Snohomish and Whatcom counties to provide screenings, referrals, and/or treatment to drug-impacted youth.
- Thanks to the generous support of local parishes and advocacy of local government agencies, CCS/CHS successfully opened **Martha's Place**, the first permanent supportive housing in Skagit County. With support from 24/7 case management, 69 couples and individuals have emerged from chronic homelessness to live in a community.
- The Farmworker Center (FWC), nationally recognized as a model for farmworker outreach, will host an event for other US Catholic Charities in the Spring. The FWC continues to play an essential role in the Skagit community, partnering with the Museum of Northwest Art, Work Source, Skagit Legal Aid, the Northwest Agricultural Business Center, the Mexican consulate, and Skagit Community College, to meet the needs of thousands of men, women, and children through social services, classes, and special events.
- Thanks to a two-year \$2.7 million grant from the USDA Farm Food Worker Relief Program administered through **Catholic Charities USA**, CCS NW provides direct aid to agricultural workers.
- NW Ambassador Core was launched to help parishioners share their knowledge of CCS/CHS local programs helping neighbors in need.
- The agency is engaged with members of the **Swinomish and Lummi tribes** to receive information about historical trauma resulting from the Native American experience in boarding schools.

COMMUNITIES OF CONCERN

CCS/CHS actively participates in the **Communities of Concern Commission**, a statewide coalition of Black, Indigenous, and Communities of Color in urban and rural areas disproportionally affected by poverty.

FAMILY BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

CCS FBH is a recognized leader and pioneer among state behavioral agencies. This year, FBH hosted child welfare experts and agency leaders from Japan seeking to learn how to better address and prevent child abuse and neglect using programs like our **Wraparound with Intensive Services (WISe)**. 95% of the thousands of children and youth we served last year with intensive mental health treatment, integrated pediatric outpatient services, crisis response, and de-escalation remained safely with their families.

IMMIGRATION

Catholic Charities USA awarded CCSWW two grants in 2023 to provide asylum-seekers in our region with help and support. A \$25,000 grant provided direct financial assistance to clients of CCS' Catholic Immigration Legal Services (CILS). CCSWW divided the second grant of \$350,000 between CILS and 41 parishes providing emergency services and supplies to refugees in their communities.

LONG TERM CARE (LTC)

CCS Long Term Care (LTC). Last year, we served 4,600 homebound elders and others with disabilities, helping to keep people in their homes in all 19 counties of western Washington. This year, thanks in part to CCS LTC advocacy, more low-income clients are benefiting from "the most significant anti-poverty change in Long Term Care in many years:" the increase of their personal needs allowance from 100% to 300% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL).

NETWORK BUILDERS

Every year, **CCS Network Builders** work regionally to support service ministries in our deaneries and parishes, connecting the faithful to the people we serve. This year, CCS Network Builders are finding ways to support parish service ministries as they discern the path ahead through the Partners in the Gospel process.

PREPARES (PREGNANCY AND PARENTING SUPPORT)

One hundred four parish partners have joined the CCSWW **Pregnancy and Parenting Support Program**, offering vulnerable families the promise of support and assistance from pregnancy to their child's fifth birthday, including food, clothing, diapers, parenting classes, and referrals to social services. This year, parish volunteers offered special events including community baby showers for high school Teen Parent programs, and participation in Welcome Circle Family Days for refugees.
