


Anointings:

During Advent, we skip the joyful Alleluia before the proclamation of the Gospel to build a sense of longing for Jesus' birth. This custom comes from early monastic practices, creating a holy silence that makes the song's return at Christmas feel even more powerful. As we stand for the reading, we respect this quiet moment. It shows our faith and hope, calling us to wait for the Savior with hearts full of reverence.



This week we hear that John the Baptist is out in the wilderness eating "locusts and wild honey" (Mark 1:6). It's not just a strange historical detail. It's a symbolic expression of a healthy spiritual diet. The path to Christ includes both the hard and the beautiful, the gritty and the sweet. We have to learn to gulp the locusts and savor the honey.

I remember working with a young couple preparing for marriage. They were sincere, but raw — barely beginning to discover faith. Part of me wanted to rush them ahead, to fill in all the gaps, to bombard them with scripture and church documents. I swallowed that instinct. It was like eating locusts. But I also recall them light up as they spoke about each other, about their first child, then their second.

And they wanted to be close to God. Something innocent and beautiful was unfolding. That was the honey. I knew God was asking me to savor it.

This Advent, maybe we're each being invited to accept both locusts and honey. Maybe it's time to stop avoiding the difficult parts of faith — prayer that feels dry, the call to repentance, the patience with the troublesome. It's time to eat some locusts.

But we also need to notice the small gifts God gives us: a peaceful moment, a good conversation, the joy of serving someone else, new life, good intentions of our friends. That's the honey. Savor it! John didn't avoid either. He took it all in. And so can we. What are your locusts? Your honey? If we let God feed us with both, we'll be ready — really ready — for the coming of Christ.

Putting Faith into Action Across Western Washington

Addressing Homelessness with Compassion and Care

Across Washington state, homelessness continues to rise, with a 25% increase in our homeless population since 2022. Our neighbors experiencing homelessness deserve love, respect, and solutions. CCS provides comprehensive, innovative support to help our neighbors find long-term stability. Our Family Housing Network helps families like Michelle and Brent, who you read about in our most recent letter, quickly transition from homelessness to stable housing. This spring, our Junction Point shelter added 40 new pallet beds for adults experiencing homelessness. Junction Point resident Lisa says, "Junction Point is very uplifting — it gives you a reason to want to do better."

Stepping Up to Serve Critical Nutrition

As thousands of our neighbors across Western Washington lose access to federally funded SNAP benefits, CCS remains committed to serving our neighbors facing food insecurity with love and compassion. In July, we welcomed the Queen Anne Food Bank into our program network to ensure it has the support and resources it needs to continue its decades of impact. With CCS, the Food Bank has been able to remain a vital part of their community, serving an average of 125 people every weekday. For seniors facing food insecurity, our Home Delivered Meals program brings food right to their doorstep. One senior with the Home Delivered Meals program, Sarada, says, "Catholic Community Services is a godsend."

Providing Housing that is Stable, Affordable, and Permanent

Housing affordability is a growing problem in Western Washington. That's why CCS provides permanent affordable housing for our neighbors unable to otherwise access housing. Our housing sites are home to neighbors of all ages and backgrounds and include housing dedicated to families, farmworkers, people with disabilities, and veterans. One family living in farmworker housing is Maria, Daniel, and their two young sons. In a Catholic Housing Services home, they've finally found a safe place to raise their family. "Catholic Housing Services is a great help and made a big difference for our family," Daniel says.



2024 CCS Program Highlights



Last year, we served 113,279 neighbors with 190 programs made possible through the dedication of 4,074 staff members and 2,059 volunteers.



12 Family Centers serving 19 Western Washington counties offered 60,310 people access to diverse programs.



18,910 seniors and people with disabilities received in-home care totaling **2,162,153 hours of care,** supporting them to continue to live independently.



329,349 nights of shelter for our neighbors experiencing homelessness provided by our **36 shelters** and repurposed motels.



2,974 units of permanent housing across **64 properties**, providing a safe and stable home to **5,500 people**.
